The General Duty Clause

Officially called Section 5(a)(1) of the Occupational Safety and Health Act, the General Duty Clause is not an official standard; instead, it operates to fill gaps in OSHA law for recognized unregulated hazards. The General Duty Clause can be referred to as a catch-all obligation. When no other standard is applicable, the General Duty Clause can be used for serious violations.

OSHA recently stated in a webchat: "We are also increasing our use of the General Duty Clause because the OSH Act makes it very clear that it is the obligation of employers to provide workplaces free of recognized hazards, whether or not there is an OSHA standard," OSHA representatives said.

The general duty clause states the following:

SEC. 5. Duties

- (a) Each employer --
 - (1) shall furnish to each of his employees employment and a place of employment which are free from recognized hazards that are causing or are likely to cause death or serious physical harm to his employees;
 - (2) shall comply with occupational safety and health standards promul-

gated under this Act. 29 USC 654

(b) Each employee shall comply with occupational safety and health standards and all rules, regulations, and orders issued pursuant to this Act which are applicable to his own actions and conduct.

During a three-year period, OSHA's issuance of General Duty Clause violations has increased more than 15 percent: In FY 2010, the agency issued roughly 1,600 violations, up from about 1,350 in FY 2008. Employers should understand the General Duty Clause and how OSHA uses it to issue citations.

Some of the issues related to underground construction that could evoke a general duty clause violation are activities such as:

1. **Worker in a bucket of a backhoe.** This is strictly prohibited by the operating manual of the piece of equipment, and presents a recognized hazard, but there is not a specific standard that prohibits this activity.
2. **Worker riding on the outside of a piece of equipment.** Once again this is strictly prohibited by the operators

manual, which would state something such as, no one is allowed on the piece of equipment except for in the operators seat with an appropriate restraint device.

3. **Workers exposed to the swinging counterweight of a backhoe.** There is no specific standard that states you must restrict travel in the area of the counterweight, or provide a warning device. Yet the industry consensus is that this area should have restricted travel and warnings should be in place, along with worker education.

All of the above items, and others could be cited as general duty clause violations.

A common misconception is that OSHA can use the General Duty Clause to cite any condition that the compliance officer believes is unsafe.

Several conditions must be met for OSHA to issue a General Duty Clause violation:

- The hazard was recognized.
- The employer failed to keep the workplace free of a hazard to which his or her employees

were exposed.

- A feasible and useful method was available to correct the hazard.
- The hazard was causing or likely to cause death or serious injury.

In summary, every company must abide by the established OSHA standards, and must also pay attention to other areas where workers are exposed to serious injuries. While the amount of recent OSHA citations in our area have seemed to increase quite substantially, the most important point is that we must prevent injuries to our workers by spending time every day addressing the individual hazards we are confronted with on each job.

Roughneck Wins Union Jurisdictional Lawsuit Appeal

UCA member Roughneck Concrete Drilling & Sawing Co. received good news from the Court when it ruled in their favor recently regarding a long and potentially expensive dispute between the company (Roughneck) and the Plumbers Pension Fund, Local 130 (Fund).

In short, the Fund claimed that Roughneck had not employed

Plumbers to perform certain jobs within their jurisdiction, but had instead utilized Laborers for that work. The Fund claimed unpaid pension and other benefits that would have been paid to the Fund had Plumbers been employed exceeding \$2.2 million.

Fortunately, the 7th Judicial Court of Appeals opinion correctly stated that jurisdictional disputes of

this sort should not be heard by the venue chosen by the Fund, and that their claim should be dismissed.

UCA joined with other business associations in financing a "Friend of the Court" brief in support of Roughneck. We also hope that this ruling will put a damper on future jurisdictional disputes that pit one union against another, with the contractor stuck in the mid-

dle. It is our belief that once a specific trade has been paid benefits for work performed, any subsequent jurisdictional disputes should only concern those payments, and should prohibit a second payment of full benefits to another bargaining unit. The full ruling is available on UCA's website.

Legislative Update

Illinois Statehouse Update

Workers Compensation Reforms Debated

Late last year the Illinois General Assembly held a series of hearings regarding the current Workers Compensation program. Multiple ideas to reform the system were discussed but no legislation passed to address these concerns before the end of the session.

However, the General Assembly did pass a large income tax increase. Unease among citizens regarding the tax increase, combined with business flight from Illinois has pushed legislative leaders to again consider "reforms" to the Workers Compensation program. Their efforts are seen as seriously attempting to reform problems with the current system, or an effort to placate business interests. The key is that "reform" means different things to business and labor, and what may eventually pass to improve the current system. It's clear to businesses paying high Workers Comp insurance rates or experiencing high settlement claims, that the system needs to change.

Several business groups have combined efforts in Springfield and have created a list of priority "reforms" to the system. They are briefly:

Causation/Intoxication- Ensuring that the alleged injury actually occurred on the worksite, or that alcohol or drugs were not a factor.

Work/Life Expectancy - Adjusting the system so that the current average retirement age, instead of life expectancy, is utilized for workers receiving a modification payment due to a work related injury.

Medical Fee Schedule - Illinois' current schedule is the highest in the nation. Fees closer to those used by the Medicare/Medicaid system could reduce costs.

Utilization Review - So that an injured worker receives correct, but not excessive treatment(s) on the road to recovery.

Fraud- Increased State investigations to limit fraudulent claims.

Doctor Choice - Installing some type of employer doctor choice into the system and deter those health care providers that over treat injured workers.

AMA Guidelines - Utilize national AMA standards on levels of impairment due to injury.

Bargained for Workers Comp. - Allows us to work with our union(s) to create a better system for employers and employees. So long as we are discussing changes to the program we are pushing to add this item to the final agreement.

Apportionment - Currently, employers are liable for any worker injury, whether new or existing, the

day they are hired. A fairer system would incorporate length of service into claim settlements.

Will businesses see all of the above reforms enacted? Probably not. The Workers Compensation program involves some of the strongest political groups and lobbyists in Springfield among them lawyers and doctors. Add to the mix unions, and you have a strong incentive to maintain the status quo. Recently, the Illinois Senate voted on a bill which incorporated many of the reforms sought by business. (SB 1349 -view it on our website). Every Republican voted for it. Unfortunately, only one Democrat joined them, leading to the bill's defeat. UCA members were notified via our CapWiz program which allows you quick and easy contact with your local officials on important bills. (If you did not receive a CapWiz email, please contact Scott Dworschak at sdworschak@uca.org to add you name to the list.

The path is now set for some sort of compromise from all involved. UCA is represented with our involvement with the Illinois Construction Industry Committee (ICIC) which is a major participant in the ongoing negotiations. Action happens fast in the waning days of the General Assembly, but we will keep you up to date as best as possible on this important issue via email update and at www.uca.org.

Bills to Watch with UCA

HB 14: Infrastructure Modernization Act Allows public utilities to build in rate increases to provide long term revenue for rebuilding and updating their supply grid and provide work for many UCA members. *Has passed out of the Utility Committee and will soon be voted on by the full House.*

HB 1321: Public Payment Bond Requires a Payment bond to be purchased by developers when obtaining a Performance bond. Insures that contractors & subs will be paid for work when developers experience financial problems. *Failed to pass House Committee- we will try again next session.*

SB 1550: Prevailing Wage for Aggregate/Excavation Workers Attempts to expand prevailing wage benefits when they could not be won at the bargaining table. UCA has fought to keep this bill from becoming law for several years. *This Bill remains in Committee and is not expected to pass the Senate this session.*

Federal News: Budget Cutting Deal Affects Construction Industry

As we reported in the recent email update, federal budget negotiators announced \$38.5 billion in reductions to the current Federal budget. Some of those cuts affect the construction industry. Here is a quick listing of two departments related to construction:

OSHA takes a cut of \$1.2 million across the board, affecting all departments, as part of a two percent cut in general federal spend-

ing. However, remember that increased fining activity can still be expected on jobsites!

EPA loses \$1.6 billion in cuts, almost 16% of its FY11 budget. The Clean Water Revolving Fund in Illinois drops from \$92,149,000 to \$66,900,000, a 27% reduction. The Drinking Water Revolving Fund goes from \$51,230,000 to \$35,656,000, a reduction of 30%. These numbers

are disturbing, however, Clean Water programs have seen their budgets almost double in the preceding three years.

A delegation of your fellow UCA members will be travelling to DC next month to directly lobby our elected officials for support of infrastructure improvements & clean water programs here in Illinois.
